3.2 Describe FOUR (4) attractions that a tourist can visit in the capital city of each of the TWO (2) countries from 3.1.

MALAWI

Kamuzu Academy, just north of capital is the 'Eton of Africa' and a very posh school established by former president, Kamuzu Banda.

Between City Centre and Old Town and alongside the Lingadzi River are 180 hectares of the **Lilongwe Nature Sanctuary**. Malawi's only sanctuary for orphaned, injured and rescued wild animals and plays an active role in conservation.

Kamuzu Mausoleum in Heroes Acre. A huge portrait of Malawi's first 'president for life', Kamuzu Banda, adorns the entrance. The Mausoleum also houses a library and research centre.

Tobacco Auction Floors is 7 km north of the city.

ZAMBIA

Kabwata Cultural Village is home to 72 woodcarvers, basket weavers and artists who showcase their products here. It's a great tourist place.

Munda Wanga Botanical Gardens, with nearly 500 species of plants and one of the few places in the city suitable for a picnic, is also a reason for a visit.

National Museum. Contemporary Zambian paintings and sculptures are displayed downstairs. There's a basic cafeteria on site and access to the museum is off Independence Ave.

The **Freedom Statue**, just around the corner from the museum, is dedicated to freedom fighters and those who lost their lives in the struggle for Zambia's independence. (4×3) (12)

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KENYA

Kenya National Museum, is on Museum Hill, approximately 10 minutes' drive from the city centre and can be accessed easily via both public and private means. The facility was opened way back in 1910 by a group of naturalists.

Bomas of Kenya is a cultural centre at Langata, near the main gate to Nairobi National Park. The talented resident artistes perform traditional dances and songs taken from the country's 16 various tribal groups.

Karen Blixen Museum. This charming farmhouse is where Karen Blixen, author of the popular novel *Out of Africa*, lived from 1914 to 1931. She left after a series of personal tragedies, but the lovely colonial house has been preserved as a museum.

Nairobi National Park, which is 5 km from Parliament and covers 117 km² and has abundant wildlife which can, in places, be viewed against a backdrop of city skyscrapers and airliners coming in to land at the nearby airport. Remarkably, the animals seem utterly unperturbed by it all. The park contains lion, cheetah, black rhino, giraffe, hippo and many antelope species.

MOROCCO

Although not its largest city, Rabat is Morocco's capital and 'Royal City'. The Royal Palace is the official residence of King Hassan II of Morocco.

Hassan Tower towers above Oued Bou Regreg, surrounded by well-tended gardens is Rabat's most famous landmark. The Almohads' most ambitious project would have been the second-largest mosque of its time, after Samarra in Iran.

The interesting **Archaeology Museum** (even if the labels are only in Arabic and French) gives a good account of Morocco's history. Prehistoric finds include a beautiful neolithic rock carving of a man surrounded by concentric circles. The highlight of the collection is the Salle des Bronzes, which displays ceramics, statuary and artefacts from Roman settlements.

Mausoleum of Mohammed V. Near the Hassan Tower stands this marble mausoleum, built in traditional Moroccan style. The present king's father and grandfather have been laid to rest here. The decoration, despite the patterned zellij and carved plaster, gives off an air of tranquility. (4×3)

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UGANDA

Of great significance to the Buganda Kingdom, the huge thatched-roof palace of the World Heritage – listed **Kasubi Tombs**. Built in 1882 as the palace of the King Mutesa I, it was converted into his tomb following his death two years later.

National Museum. One of the best museums in East Africa, there's plenty to catch your interest here. There's a varied and well-captioned collection covering hunting, agriculture, war, religion and recreation, as well as archaeological and natural history displays. The most popular feature is a collection of traditional musical instruments, some of which you can play. Mengo Palace. At the other end of a ceremonial drive leading from parliament, Mengo Palace was built in 1922 and is the former home of the Buganda king. But it has remained empty since 1966 when the then prime minister, Milton Obote, ordered a dramatic attack to oust King Mutesa II (then president of Uganda).

The **National Botanical Gardens of Uganda** are located in <u>Entebbe</u>. They were laid out in 1898 by the first curator, <u>A. Whyte</u>, close to the shore of <u>Lake Victoria</u>. The gardens are divided into different zones, including a <u>rainforest</u> zone. This rainforest formed the backdrop to scenes from the <u>Tarzan</u> films, featuring Johnny Weissmuller, shot in the 1940s. (4×3)
